I am not sure how I can help, but as a resident I wanted to voice my support for the final draft Map B-1. It looks great!

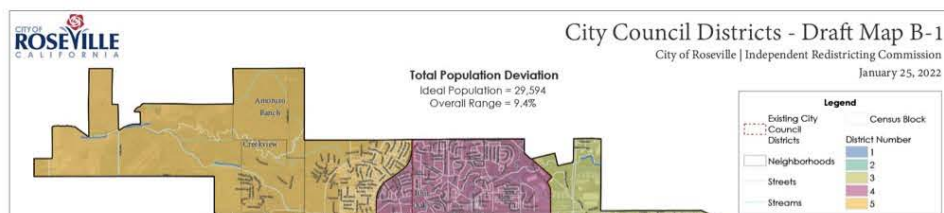
Draft Map B-1

The Roseville Independent Redistricting Commission selected a modified version of Draft Map B as the final draft City Council district map at its January 24, 2022 public meeting. The final draft map, referred to as Draft Map B-1, will be available for public review and comment for 30 days.

Draft Map B-1 is an adjusted version of Draft Map B. The adjustments were made by the Independent Redistricting Committee on January 25, 2022 following a series of public hearings in January 2022. Draft Map B was originally published for public consideration on December 20, 2021.

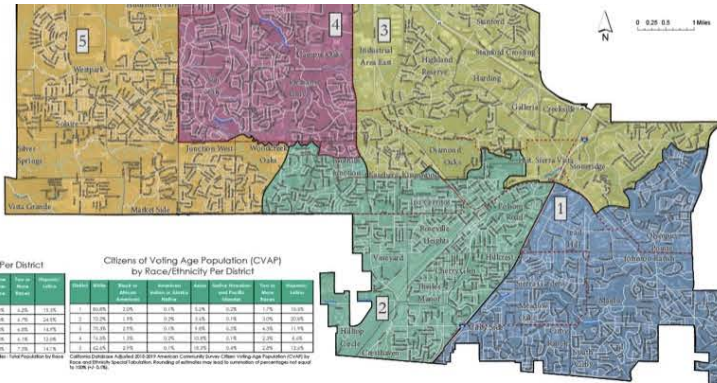

Dear Commissioners,

First, thank you for your perseverance in wading through hours of testimony and pages of charts, graphs, narratives, and countless letters from Roseville residents. You have my praise and thanks.

Now, right to the point.

My first choice is Draft Map C. It provides for two city council members, District 1 and 3, to represent significant portions of the area east of Interstate 80. If only one council member represented this area, council concerns for this area might be diminished with four votes favoring districts west of Interstate 80. The downside here is that it preserves just 78% of neighborhoods. However, I would argue that Stoneridge, Lead Hill and Olympus Pointe are all neighborhoods that should be preserved together on the east side of Interstate 80, even if separated from the rest of District 3 by Interstate 80.

My second choice is Draft Map B. It still maintains two council districts, 1 and 3, representing the area east of Interstate 80, although a smaller portion of District 3 remains in this area. With a significantly reduced portion, just Stoneridge left in District 3, separated from the rest of the district by Interstate 80, it may not get the representation it deserves because of its isolation. A plus for this map is that 91% of the neighborhoods are preserved and all but the Stoneridge neighborhood stay in District 1. However, Lead Hill and Olympus Pointe are removed from what seems to be a community of interest that should remain together with Stoneridge.

As for the other maps, Drafts A, D, E, and F, they essentially isolate east Roseville into one council district with a small portion, Cirby Side, placed in District 2, cut out of its regular community of interest and neighborhood east of Interstate 80 and placed in District 2 where it becomes isolated from its new district by Interstate 80.

Stick with it my friends.
